Is it going to be a white Christmas and if you don't know, can you guess what the weather most likely will be? In Dublin, and most of the rest of the country, it won't get cold enough for snow. This is because of a combination of living on an island (the sea keeps us from getting too cold) and of climate change where the world is warming generally.

How much snow do you need to call it a white Christmas?

One snowflake (if it falls at Dublin Airport between 00:00 and 23:59 on 25th

December). Or at least, that's enough if you've placed a bet on it!

To have a whiteish Christmas outside your house, you probably need around 1cm of snow (which is about the same as 1mm of rain).

Then you need it to stay cold enough so it doesn't melt before you get out to pelt your Dad with snowballs.

To have a 'proper' white Christmas, you really want around 10cm of snow, enough to stop the country in its tracks for a day.

How many white Christmases



have happened in the last 20 years? Only two: 2009 and 2010 had very cold and snowy weather around Christmas though it all melted on St Stephen's Day in 2010. For contrast, Christmas Day 2011 had temperature around 10 Celsius, nearly 20 degrees hotter than Christmas Day 2010!



I tried to film as much as I could and I showed the children what I had seen on my return. I saw small icebergs which had been carved into various shapes by the action of the waves and winds against the ice.



Another exciting event was when we sailed to Deception Island, which has a huge bay surrounded by volcanic rock and stones, and most of it bleak, desolate, dreary and cold. Whalers discovered that Deception Island was not an island at all but a huge underwater volcano. which is still active.

We were invited to take a swim in the bay, and about 30 to 40 were brave enough to try it· I was very surprised to see people in swimming outfits enjoying the swim and lolling about· I took off my boots and socks and walked into the sea· I discovered the water was warm! Quickly I got into my togs and ran in·
