
He said they all finished the year, and their time at GETNS, on a great high.

High school survival guide

Have you ever wondered what it's going to be like when you go to secondary school? Cara, from last year's 6th class shares her insights...

What was the first year in your new school like?

When I went into first year in Mount Temple last September, things were a bit strange to begin as the school adjusted to Covid.

For social distancing, the first month and a half my form class and three others were in the sports hall. It wasn't ideal, but luckily the classes were moved into their own classrooms soon enough and school felt more normal.

Sadly, we missed out on a few big events in first year. But overall it wasn't that bad. Of course, people in other schools will have had a different experience.

What are the differences?

A big difference for me would be break: we have one 40-minute break and a smaller 15-minute break, when we can go outside to the field, eat lunch and meet friends from any class.

There was also a cafeteria we could get lunch from, but that's closed due to restrictions. And there are vending machines where you can buy snacks.

Another big difference would be the classes and having a timetable. Unlike in primary school, we move classrooms for different subjects and have different people in each class.

We often need to bring in books for the classes we have on that day (some schools use iPads so I don't think they need to do this), and have set times for each class.

Is it tough, the way they show it in Wimpy Kid and other books and films?

Well in my year, most people are very nice. There are a few who aren't as nice. But from my experience, if you avoid them, they won't bother you.

The work isn't that much harder than in primary school, but there is quite a bit more of it. There are more tests, mostly to assess how you're doing.

First year exams aren't that important, they're more to show how well you're understanding the subject, so you don't need to stress about them too much. Some tests can be harder than others and you often need to study for them, but if you understand what you're doing in the subject you'll be fine.

What's better and what's worse than in primary?

I think having an extra month of summer holidays and having a timetable is great. I also like having a longer lunch break and having different people in different classes.

Having more tests and having to study for them is not so good and the school day is longer (until 3.30pm most days), which is not great either.

Do you have to do homework over the holidays?

We'd sometimes get a small project or piece of homework due by the end of a bank holiday or over the weekend etc, but you aren't given work for Christmas and summer holidays. And usually you have a chance during the week to get the work done before the holiday.

What's your best advice?

My advice for going into first year is to try to stay in contact with your friends.

Your class in primary school will be split up into different secondary schools, which means you don't see people that often anymore. So it can be difficult to stay in touch with old friends unless you make an extra effort.

Also remember there's no pressure to make a huge bunch of new friends at the start of the year, especially with Covid restrictions.


"Do you think scientists came to our house and gave us powers?" Charlie guessed.




ANIMAL FACTS FROM THE EXPERTS
