Glasnevin ETNS Parents Pact: Smartphone Ownership & Social Media Use

The Parents of Glasnevin ETNS are invited to enter into this pact as one measure available to parents to embed CyberSafeKids Ireland's online safety guidance in our school community. That guidance includes: doing fun stuff online but making sure parents do it together with their children, keeping a close eye on kids when they are online and introducing technology gradually (with delayed ownership being best practice)

As parents we value communicating with and supporting each other in keeping our children safe online. Whether you choose to participate in this Pact or not, parents are encouraged to talk to each other about ensuring online safety for our children and championing best practice in applying parental controls and creating healthy habits. It came to the attention of the PTA that many parents were concerned about the wider risks and pressures involved in (1) owning a smart phone and (2) accessing social media sites from any device.

CyberSafeKids Ireland's Annual Year in Review 2022-2023 Report (published 5th Sept 2023) highlights that of the 8 to12 year olds surveyed:

- 47% owned a smartphone (rising to 74% for 12 year olds)
- 84% had their own social media/instant messaging account
- 33% gamed with strangers online
- 28% of boys played over 18's games
- 25% experienced bullying online
- 31% had unrestricted access to the online world

This Pact is supported by the PTA. It is separate to the school's own mobile phone policy on how mobile phone use and ownership is managed *during school time*. If you opt into this Pact (which is voluntary) you agree: (1) not to buy your child his/her <u>own</u> smartphone; and (2) not to allow your child to access their <u>own</u> social media account from any device. You are free to opt out of the Pact. The Pact will be reviewed by the PTA annually and GETNS will consult with the children on the Pact in the senior cycle of the school.
